**TO FIND MAGAZINE & JOURNAL ARTICLES**



**EBSCO Article Indexes** – rich full-text resources, including:

- \* *Academic Search Premier* – both magazines & journals, good starting point.
- \* *CINAHL* – professional journals in **nursing & allied health** fields.
- \* *Business Source Premier* – focus on business, marketing, and economics



**CQ Researcher** – Full-text magazine.

Each weekly issue is an extensive report on a current social “**hot topic**.”



**Google Scholar** ([scholar.google.com](http://scholar.google.com)) - Professional **research articles**

Includes papers from conferences and anthologies as well as journals.

Limited full-text (click the “See all xxx versions” – one might be full-text).

## FULL-TEXT ENCYCLOPEDIAS & OTHER REFERENCE BOOKS



### ***Gale Virtual Reference Library***

Includes the monumental *Dictionary of American History* and *Grzimek's Animal Life Encyclopedia*, along with dozens of specialized works such as the Encyclopedia of Cancer, Encyclopedia of Food & Culture, Encyclopedia of Small Business, etc.



### ***NetLibrary's "Reference Center"***

Click the Reference Center link in NetLibrary to search specifically in its collection of a few hundred academic encyclopedias and dictionaries.



### ***Access Science***

A massive online encyclopedia of **science & technology**.

## TO FIND BOOKS



### **CCC Library Catalog** (includes links to our *netLibrary* e-Books)

Try a **keyword** search for books on a subject.

To search by **author** give the last name first (carver, raymond).

Use the *View Your Library Record* button to **renew** your items online & check holds, etc.



### ***NetLibrary – our e-Book Collection***

Thousands of our current, academic books are in electronic format. View them through *netLibrary*. Create your own account from our computers to access *netLibrary* from home, take notes, etc. Try the **Reference Center**.



### **Combined library catalogs.**

Use these to find additional books to request through ILL.

**Summit** is a catalog of academic libraries in the Northwest.

**WorldCat** is a huge catalog of both public and academic libraries around the world.

(Precision searching may be easier in Summit, which uses the same software as the CCC library catalog.)



### ***Google Books***

Provides “snippets,” selected pages, or full-text of a vast collection of books, depending on their copyright status. (Use the “Find this book in a library” link to see if we have the book – this actually connects into *WorldCat*. Small world...)

## TO FIND FREE WEB RESOURCES



### **Commercial Search Engines**

Google is a good choice; specify results with the site command, *site:.gov*, *site:.edu*, etc. Use quotes for an exact phrase search - “no child left behind”



### **Academic Search Engines**

To search a set of hand-selected websites, try one of these: *Intute* ([www.intute.ac.uk](http://www.intute.ac.uk)); *Librarians' Index to the Internet* ([lii.org](http://lii.org)); or *Infomine* ([infomine.ucr.edu](http://infomine.ucr.edu)).



### **Wikipedia** ([www.wikipedia.org](http://www.wikipedia.org))

an “open-access” encyclopedia (anyone can write/edit articles). Wikipedia is not a scholarly resource, and is not generally suitable for citing in your term papers; however, it may be useful in leading you quickly to other, more authoritative resources.
