



## II. NETLIBRARY'S "REFERENCE CENTER"

Several hundred of the e-books we've bought from NetLibrary are encyclopedias, dictionaries, handbooks, etc. You can search through them all at once for a topic by choosing the **Reference Center** at NetLibrary's search page – it's in the box on the right.

### SEARCHING

**Search** for your topic in the "**Entry**" search box: \_\_\_\_\_

This searches for your term in the **titles of articles** ("entries") in the reference books.

(No results or poor results? Try using the "eContent search" box below, changing "Title" to "Full-text.")

This will find any article that at least mentions your term.)

Select a **signed article** from an **encyclopedia**. Having trouble finding one? Try this:

Go back to the Reference Center search page.

Instead of searching, pick an encyclopedia from the **subject list** on the right.

View the article. Is it in:      HTML format      or      PDF format

(Use the "**Contents**" tab in the left-hand frame to view the table of contents. The contributor list is usually near the beginning; if not, scroll down and try at the end. When found, click to view.)
